COURSE SYLLABUS

Course Title: Art History I Course #: ART 101

<u>Course Description</u>: An extensive study of art and architecture derived from all principal art historical periods in the west: Prehistoric, Ancient Egyptian, Mesopotamian, Aegean, Greek, Etruscan, and Roman. The Medieval era will include Early Christian, Byzantine, Romanesque, Gothic, and Fourteenth-Century Art. In addition, early art from Asia, Africa, and the Americas will be explored. The art and architecture of each succeeding era will be explored contextually and analyzed according to form, content and continuity.

Pre-requisite/Co-requisite: eligibility for ENG 101

Goals: Students will:

- Identify and examine the most important art works from ancient through medieval times
- Participate in discussions about the historical and cultural significance of art styles, iconography, and individual art works; discuss changes between time periods and places
- Learn to organize and write formal analysis essays on major art works
- Create a comparison/contrast presentation on two major art works
- Visit a museum, analyze its roles and display methods, and gain a deeper appreciation for experiencing art works in person

Outcomes: Upon completing this class, students will be able to:

- Identify styles in painting, sculpture, architecture, and other media and recognize why styles have changed over time
- Recognize the major iconography of time periods and places, while understanding their historical and cultural significance
- Identify, describe, interpret, and analyze the most important works of art from ancient through medieval times
- Examine the multi-faceted relationship between a society and its art, including analysis of the various reasons for creating art
- Utilize art vocabulary and basic interpretive theory when discussing art
- Recognize major technical developments in art media and their implications
- Observe the purposes and roles of museums and how their display methods affect our understanding of art works, as well as recognize the value of experiencing art works in person
