Course Title: Large Animal Veterinary Technology Course #: VET *152 & 152L

<u>Course Description:</u> 3 semester hours. (3 lecture hours, 2 laboratory hours) This course will be an overview of the technical aspects of large animal veterinary care. Emphasis will be on large animal handling, restraint and medication. In addition, common medical conditions, routine large animal care, basic nutrition and preventive health care will be discussed. Field trips will be required with students providing their own transportation.

<u>Pre-requisites:</u> VET*100 Introduction to Animal Care, and VET*101 Introduction to Veterinary Technology, BIO* 115 or 121, CHE* 111, MAT* 137, CSA* 105

<u>Goals:</u> The student should develop an understanding of and be able to perform basic nursing procedures used in large animal veterinary medicine. The basic theory will be presented in lecture followed by its application in the laboratory/field trips.

Outcomes: Upon completion of this course the student should be able to:

- Demonstrate proper methods of large animal restraint on live animals
- Discuss the basics of large animal behavior, and include species-specific differences
- Maintain medical records, and forms on farm field trips
- Discuss vaccination protocols used in horses and small ruminants and demon-strate competence in vaccinating livestock on farm field trips
- Discuss basic concepts of large animal reproduction
- Demonstrate a familiarity with large animal breeds, colors and clinically-relevant anatomy
- Identify livestock feeds on farm field trips
