COURSE SYLLABUS

<u>Course Title:</u> Introduction to Interpreting in Health Care Situations

Course #: INT* 231

Course Description: 3 credits

This course is a survey of the field of interpreting in various health care settings. The focus will be on interpreting communication interactions in hospitals, doctor's offices, and other medical facilities. Also included will be mental health interpreting and interpreting in substance abuse/recovery settings through the Demand/Control philosophy.

Pre-requisite/Co-requisite: Prerequisite: INT* 103 Pre-Interpreting Skills. Co-requisite: INT* 112 Consecutive Interpreting

Goals: 1. To introduce terminology for medical/mental health/and substance abuse settings.

2. To develop familiarity with standard procedures in clinical settings.

3. To analyze basic processes of medical intervention for common

physical and/or mental conditions.

- 4. To explore the issues of addiction and recovery.
- 5. Evaluate appropriate and inappropriate advocacy and functional

leadership.

6. To expand ePortfolio.

Outcomes: By the end of the course the student will be able to:

- Demonstrate and recognize sign vocabulary for medical/mental health/and substance abuse terms;
- Describe, through use of own body, where vital organs are located and their primary function;
- Identify blood born pathogens;
- Describe common diseases;
- Classify basic job duties of various medical personnel;
- Explain standard emergency room procedures;
- Identify issues related to interpreting pre-, post-and operating room interactions;
- Recognize equipment/instruments used in routine medical procedures;
- Define major categories of mental health disorders;
- Explain typical challenges and possible solutions for interpreting for mental health patients;
- Outline safety measures for interpreters in health care settings;

- Explain the philosophy of "12 step" programs and the concept underlying the individual steps;
- State tactics used to maintain professional distance in emotionally charged situations;
- Add to ePortfolio entries related to healthcare.
