COURSE SYLLABUS

Course Title: Professional Standards in Interpreting Course #: INT* 121

Course Description: An introduction to the field of interpreting, including an overview of the general

socio-cultural systems and socio-political aspects involved, as well as

professional ethics and standards for interpreting. 3 semester hours.

Pre-requisite: ASL* 205 and INT*103 Co-requisite: ASL* 202

Goals:

- 1. To acquaint students with professional ethics and standards of interpreters.
- 2. To expose students to a full-range of interpreting settings.
- 3. To introduce potential problems encountered while interpreting and to develop an awareness of possible solutions.
- 4. To identify the basic skills, knowledge, and attitudes essential to the interpreting profession and how they are applied.
- 5. To investigate current issues in the interpreting profession.

Outcomes: At the conclusion of the course the student will be able to

- Explain the structure and purpose of the Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf (RID) & National Association of the Deaf (NAD) in relation to certifying interpreters, nationally.
- List and apply the RID Professional Code of Conduct and the concept of professionalism to various interpreting settings/situations.
- Describe the Certification Maintenance Program
- Define state and national laws (generic) related to interpreters and the rights of Deaf
- Describe the activities required by interpreters for maintaining professionalism on varying assignments from work acquisition to assignment completion.
